Questions for Reflection and Discussion

The message of *the whole book* of 1 Peter can be stated as:

God Almighty solved the problem of His sinful, rebellious creation by choosing to draw us to himself, sending his Son and Spirit to save us, and endowing us with new affections and abilities, **so that** we will glorify him, enjoy him, and (by lovingly blessing those who hate God and us) will be agents of reconciliation, **so that** more rebels (such as us) would be drawn into God's kingdom.

Review the Sermon Summary, connecting elements of the sermon to the message of the whole book.

 Had you ever considered the idea that people have to be *chosen* and *given* if they are to be saved? How does John 6:37-39, 44, 65 and 10:28-29 clarify your understanding? What questions remain?

Using Romans 3:9-18, explain this statement: "If God did not choose and give, none would be saved?"

- Read 1 Peter 2:16-17 and Galatians 5:13-15. What about the biblical understanding of freedom... ... interested you? ...made sense? ...confused you? ...upset you? ...encouraged you? ...and **why?**
- Make a list of the *indicatives* ("What's true.") and the *imperatives* ("What to do.") found in 1 Peter 1:3-10.

On a scale of 1—10, to what degree do you think you truly believe and embrace those indicatives?
