Questions for Reflection & Discussion

Open your Bible to Ephesians 3:14-21. Let's see what we can learn about the heart of the church...

- Paul begins his prayer by giving us his motive for praying ("For this reason...", repeating what he'd said in Ephesians 3:1). So, we have to go back to Ephesians 2 to find out what motivates this prayer: they had been dead in their sins and under God's wrath (2:1-3), but now God has given them life (2:4-7) and citizenship within the people of God (2:11-13). God has reconciled and united all believers (2:14-22). Why do you think that would drive Paul to pray for the Ephesian believers?
- Now that Paul has given the "why" of his prayer, he moves onto the "what", specifically that
 they would be "_____ with power through His Spirit in the _____."

Open your Bible to 2 Corinthians 4:16-18. People consist of an "inner man" and an "outer man". **How** is the "outer man" described? So, **what exactly is** the "outer man"? **How** is the "inner man" described? So, **what exactly is** the "inner man"?

Paul's "outer man" experienced plenty of difficulties (see 2 Corinthians 11:23-27), but he didn't seem to care much about bodily sufferings—*his own or others!* What does that suggest to you?

• Paul's prayer for inner, spiritual power had an objective, a goal (Ephesians 3:18-19a). What was it?

Paul desired the Ephesians to "comprehend and know" something that "*surpasses* knowledge"! What in the world do you think that means? How do you think that's accomplished?

You love your children—and *they* know it. Your children know something that all of the world's Nobel Laureates put together *don't* know. Relate that truth to v. 19a.

Every saint (aka "believer") is to know "the love of Christ in all its breadth, length, height and depth". Do **you** know that you know Christ's "unknowable" love? If so, tell us about it.

- Paul's desire for them to comprehend the unknowable extent of Christ's love had an objective, a goal. According to v. 19b, what was it?
 - Notice how Paul piles up the superlatives: he wants believers to be "filled up / to all / the fullness / of God" (much like v. 18 where he uses four dimensions to try to describe the indescribable love of Christ)! What does it look like to be "filled up to all the fullness of God"?

Does that describe you? Explain.

Sermon Summary Key Text: Ephesians 3:14-21

The church is a gathering of people who are reconciled to God by faith in Christ and reconciled to each other by the Spirit that dwells within us. Paul moves from exhortation of the church to intercession for the church. His prayer will reveal **four realities of our reconciliation**.

I. God is our Father. (14-15)

We approach Him humbly. (14)

We ascribe Him honor. (15)

II. God is our Strength. (16-17a)

His Spirit is our source of inner strength. (16)

His Son settles our soul by faith. (17a)

III. God's Love Transforms Us. (17b-19)

The love of God establishes us as we begin to comprehend Him and His goodness. (17b-18)

An intimate relationship with Christ leads to holiness. (19)

"When the apostle desires that his readers may be strengthened through the Spirit and experience the effects of Christ's indwelling so that they may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God, he is praying that they may 'be all that God wants them to be', that is, spiritually mature. Since God himself, Christ himself, is the standard, then this means being perfect as he is perfect, being holy as he is holy."

IV. God's Glory is Revealed to Us. (20-21)

The Goodness of God works for us. (20a)

The Greatness of God works in us. (20b)

The Glory of God is shown through the church, in Christ, and forevermore! (21)

"God's glory in the church cannot be separated from his glory in Christ Jesus." —Peter O'Brien

The Apostle Paul prayed that the believers in Ephesus would know the love of Christ—even though it <u>surpasses</u> knowledge! How is that possible?!

When we describe how big something is, we tell its length, height, and width—three dimensions. But when Paul prayed that believers would comprehend the love of Christ, he said that it is four dimensional—breadth, length, height, and depth! Clearly Christ's love is something which must be comprehended experientially. A "textbook" description just cannot do it justice!

This week at the dinner table, have one portion of a "mystery item"—either a glass or bowl of an unusual (but pleasant) juice/puree (such as pomegranate). Ask one of your children to taste it and describe it to everyone else. Have the family ask questions, revealing your struggle to comprehend its flavor. Then ask, "What can we DO so that we can understand what you're describing?" Make the connection: Christ's love must be experienced to be understood.
