

Triangle Community Church aims to be a "transforming church". We exist to be used by God as He transforms ordinary people into extraordinary followers of Jesus Christ. TCC believes not only that life-change is possible—but that it is to be expected. Growth is God's will for his people. But transformation does not happen by accident. It requires intentional, intelligent action. 1 Timothy 4:7 instructs you to "discipline yourself for the purpose of godliness." Since "Talking Points, Walking Points" is intended both for individual reflection and for group discussion, questions vary in degree of vulnerability required. Generally it is best to begin group discussions with questions which involve less personal disclosure—but don't linger there. Be sure to "dive deep" too! The questions which require the greatest openness and honesty, as well as those in the section entitled "Digging Deeper in your Daily Quiet Time", are perfect for private reflection.

Questions for Reflection or Discussion

• How surprised are you that the Twelve could repeatedly see Jesus' miracles, and yet "not get it"?

What does that tell you about them? ...about yourself?

• How surprised are you that the Twelve could make such rapid progress in a single day?

Tell us about the time period when you saw the most rapid growth in your life. When was it? How long did it take? To what do you attribute the growth? Did it last?

• Read Deuteronomy 8:2-3. What desire within God motivated his actions toward Israel?

Tell about a time when you were tested by God. Do you think you got a passing or failing grade?

- As a group, review the "three dots" Peter connected which enabled him to move away from a hard heart.
 1 Eternal Perspective
 - **Output** Clear Perception of the Alternative
 - Confidence in and Attachment to Jesus

Which one of those three perspectives is most compelling in your life-and why?

Tell about a time when you were tempted toward faithlessness, but that perspective helped you stand firm.

Which perspective do you think is least compelling in your life—and why?

Tell about a time when you were tempted and your lack of that perspective resulted in "slippage".

What do you think would most help you strengthen those three perspectives in your life?



Mark 6:45-52

- ⁴⁵ Immediately Jesus made His disciples get into the boat and go ahead of Him to the other side to Bethsaida, while He Himself was sending the crowd away.
- ⁴⁶ After bidding them farewell, He left for the mountain to pray.
- ⁴⁷ When it was evening, the boat was in the middle of the sea, and He was alone on the land.
- ⁴⁸ Seeing them straining at the oars, for the wind was against them, at about the fourth watch of the night He came to them, walking on the sea; and He intended to pass by them.
- ⁴⁹ But when they saw Him walking on the sea,
 they supposed that it was a ghost, and cried out;
- ⁵⁰ for they all saw Him and were terrified.
