

Now, read through 2 John aloud, and then, with your Bible open, consider the following questions:

What did Jesus say in John 14:15?

What do you think—is the Old Testament "rules-based" but the New Testament "grace-based"?

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• Which do you find harder to do: "telling the truth to people" or "being loving towards others"?

Second John speaks of both. Mark the words "truth" (v. 1 [2x], 2, 3 & 4) and "love" (v. 1, 3, 5 & 6). Does John appear to have more difficulty with one or the other? Explain your thoughts.

In 2 John 7-9, how do you see these issues of truth and love interacting with each other?

In v. 10-11 we see that false teachers were infiltrating this congregation, seeking to make converts, and taking advantage of Christian hospitality to advance their cause. How might an imbalance between truth and love render believers vulnerable to attack? (See Hebrews 5:12–14 & 1 Peter 4:9.)

Christians need to wisely discern the line between clear biblical commands to hospitality (1 Peter 4:8-9), and naive acceptance of just anyone who claims to be a believer (v. 9-11)—lest we participate in their evil deeds (v. 11). In our day, false teachers don't have to knock on our door—they easily slip into our homes via the internet! How confident are you that you could discern if a teacher "has gone too far" (v. 9)?

What two things does John call false teachers (v. 7)?

• John is confident that his readers are elect (v. 1 & 13), and cannot forfeit heaven—but what is at risk (v.8)?

Read 1 Corinthians 3:8–15. From what we've seen in 2 John, make a list of things which would qualify as "gold, silver, precious stones" and those things which qualify as "wood, hay, straw".

How do you take care to make sure that you are "building on the one foundation, Jesus Christ" (v. 10c-11)?

Second John

1 The elder:

To the elect lady and her children, whom I love in the truth — and not only I, but also all who know the truth —

- 2 because of the truth that remains in us and will be with us forever.
- 3 Grace, mercy, and peace will be with us from God the Father and from Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father, in truth and love.
- 4 I was very glad to find some of your children walking in truth, in keeping with a command we have received from the Father.
- 5 So now I ask you, dear lady not as if I were writing you a new command, but one we have had from the beginning that we love one another.
- 6 This is love: that we walk according to his commands.This is the command as you have heard it from the beginning: that you walk in love.
- 7 Many deceivers have gone out into the world;they do not confess the coming of Jesus Christ in the flesh.This is the deceiver and the antichrist.
- 8 Watch yourselves so that you don't lose what we have worked for, but that you may receive a full reward.
- 9 Anyone who does not remain in Christ's teaching but goes beyond it does not have God. The one who remains in that teaching, this one has both the Father and the Son.
- 10 If anyone comes to you and does not bring this teaching, do not receive him into your home, and do not greet him;
- 11 for the one who greets him shares in his evil works.
- 12 Though I have many things to write to you, I don't want to use paper and ink. Instead, I hope to come to you and talk face to face so that our joy may be complete.
- 13 The children of your elect sister send you greetings.
